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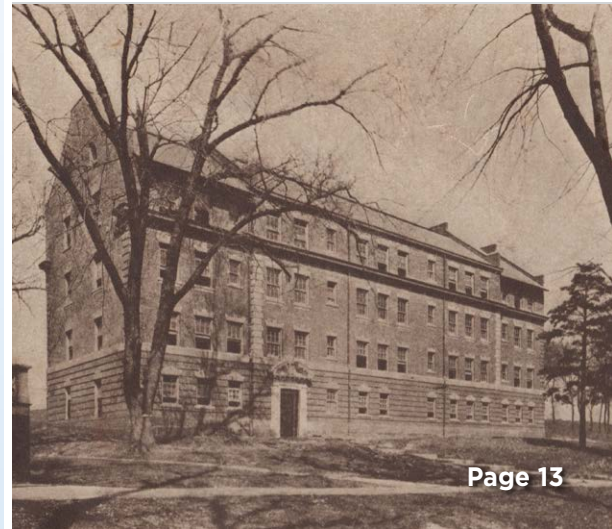
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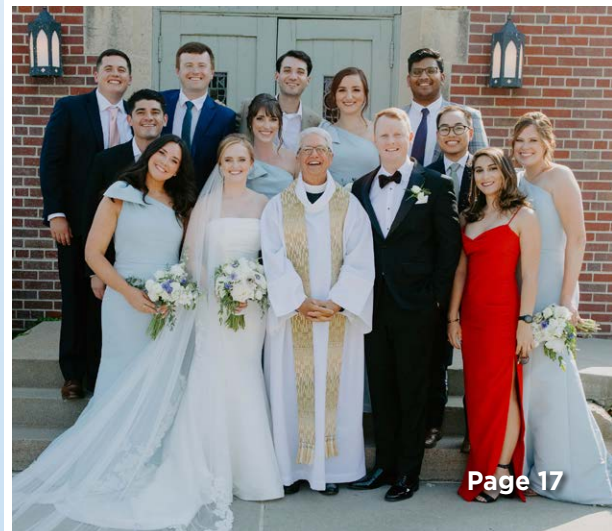

1. November Food Drive Results in Big Donation

As a school, BT collected over 3,000 items, or more than one ton of food for Completely Kids during the National Honor Society's November food drive. Donated items will be used to pack take-home meals for children, as well as prepare meals on-site for those students who visit Completely Kids after school.

2. BT Featured in Net Assets Magazine

Head of School Kristi N. Gibbs, Ed.D. was interviewed for the November/December 2023 issue of *Net Assets* magazine regarding the success of BT's Upper School tuition reset in 2020.

3. Schinzel Sets Record for Most Career Passing Yards

John Schinzel, '26, set the record for most passing yards in a career for eight-man football at BT. The previous record was set by Derek Witt, '98. John's record of 2,171 yards surpasses Witt's record by eight yards.

4. Varsity Volleyball Participates in SheMate Mentoring Program

SheMate connects high school students with their nationwide community of college, professional, Olympic, and Paralympic women athletes for virtual mentoring and wellness groups. BT's volleyball team completed



the five-week program, speaking with student athletes from Georgetown, Vanderbilt, Texas Tech, Ohio State, West Virginia, Columbia, Providence, Missouri, Elon, Wisconsin, and the Paralympics about self-talk, balancing responsibilities, handling pressure, and preparing for life after high school.

5. Third Grade Flag Football Wins League Championship

BT's third grade flag football team had a win-loss record of 4-2 for the season and ultimately won the Suburban League Championship with a score of 12-8.

6. Lanum Places at State Cross Country

Corbett Lanum, '26, placed seventh overall at the D-1 District Cross Country Invite, qualifying her for the state championship. At state, Lanum placed 22nd and beat her seeded time.

7. Students Attend Nebraska Ambassador Forum

In October, BT's Upper School American History class attended the Nebraska Ambassador Forum hosted at University of Nebraska Medical Center. The distinguished panel featured Ambassador Ronald E. Neumann, renowned for his service in

Algeria, Bahrain, and Afghanistan, as well as Ambassador Dawn M. Liberi, who represented the U.S. in Burundi. Ambassador J. Peter Pham, former U.S. Special Envoy for the Sahel Region of Africa, and the Honorable Alonzo L. Fulgham, who served as Acting Administrator of USAID, also participated.

8. Fourth Grade Runs Concessions Stand

BT's fourth graders are learning the ropes of running Booster Club's concessions stand. Fourth grade math teacher Cassie Grant arranged for this partnership with Booster Club in order to give students opportunities to apply their math skills in real-world situations while also actively contributing to our school community!

9. Eighth Grade Class Gift Promotes Cross Divisional Play

Last year the Class of 2027 gifted the game 9-Square in the Air to BT. The game was a huge hit this fall, encouraging students from all divisions, as well as faculty, staff, and administrators to take up the game and enjoy some friendly competition.

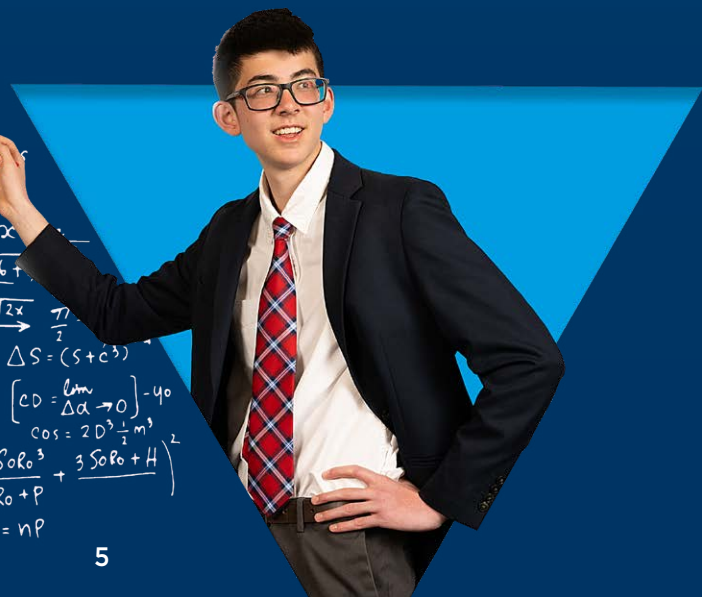
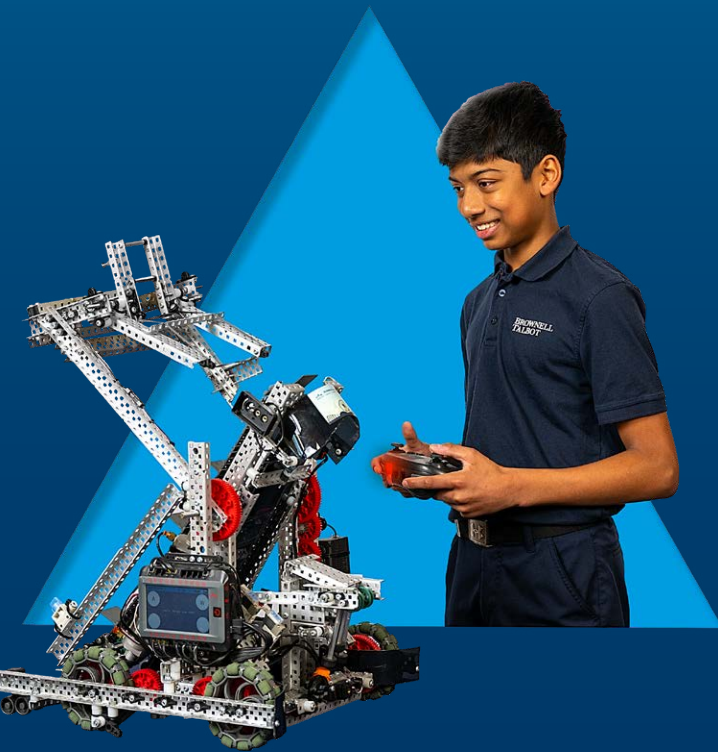
REDEFINING LIMITS TOGETHER

Bringing Service Learning to Life at Brownell Talbot



This year, Brownell Talbot is reimagining service learning to catalyze deeper community connections and empower students as advocates for their community. While service has long been a BT priority, new approaches are strengthening outcomes for partners, participants, and the causes served.

Led by Dean of Students Meg Harms, faculty now implement a rigorous IPARDE cycle when designing projects - spanning intentional Inventory and Investigation before Action, then ensuring quality Reflection, Demonstration and Evaluation afterwards. This thoughtful scaffolding promotes meaningful experiences beyond simple volunteerism.

Upper School Houses engaged in activities like skill mapping and passion project speed dating to align service initiatives to student strengths

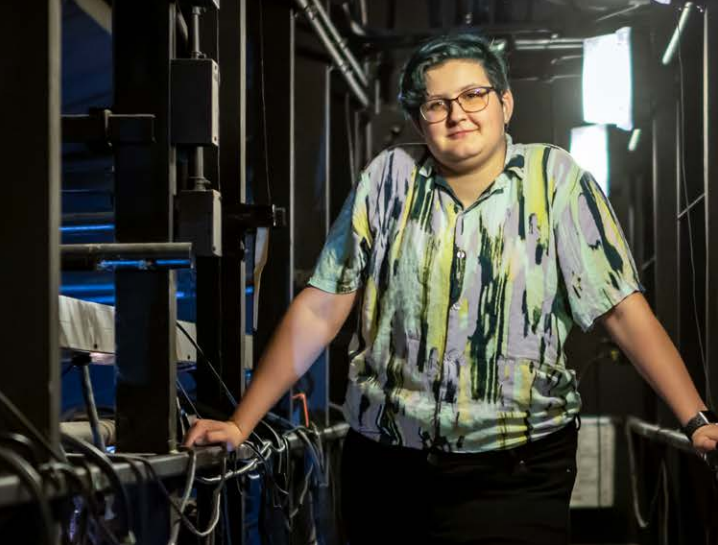
and interests. By considering their own talents and learning objectives first, participants can now better apply their gifts to community needs.

Take Hitchcock House, who partnered once more with Metro Community College's 180 Re-entry Assistance Program for the formerly incarcerated. But this year, equipped with new tools, students deepened the reciprocal impact. Attending re-entry meetings and directly engaging with program members granted vulnerable insights into the reintegration journey.

Cameron Vakili-Zadeh, '27, reflected on playing UNO with program participants and realizing the humanity beneath stereotypes, saying the service learning project introduced him to "some of the nicest people I've met. It was a very impactful experience. Meeting people from different perspectives than you is always a good thing."

Hitchcock will return later this spring during their second Service Learning day to tour the facility and gain a richer understanding of daily life after prison.

A key tenet of BT's Portrait of a Graduate calls for ethical citizens influencing humanity - beginning locally. Through reimagined service learning, students gain confidence to advocate for needs beyond themselves. BT nurtures this progression thoughtfully, ensuring growth for its students and communities alike.



BACKSTAGE BRILLIANCE:

Finding a Passion for Theatre Tech

In second grade, Ally Newman, '24, and their mom went to see *Disney On Ice* and was mesmerized. But not by the skaters. Ally's attention was intensely focused on the people they could see moving about in the shadows.

"I asked my mom who they were," Ally said. "She had theatre tech friends in college and was able to explain the role of the tech crew. I immediately wanted to be one of them."

In 2019, when Ally began attending BT, the COVID-19 pandemic dramatically limited options for participating in theatre. So Ally began looking for opportunities outside of school. Age restrictions limited where Ally could work, but eventually they found PACE (Pottawattamie Arts Culture Entertainment) who partnered with Chanticleer Community Theatre and Ally joined the tech crew for their performance of *The Music Man*.

In many ways, Ally is a typical senior. They have homework that they work on in between classes and late at night, they participate in BT theatre and on the Science Olympiad team, and they spend hours imagining what next year will hold and how it will serve as a building block to their future.

In other ways, they are very unique. For the past two years, Ally has been an apprentice at Omaha Community Playhouse, often starting their day with classes at BT, heading to the playhouse in the afternoon, where they often work until 10:00 pm. They have also been taking classes at Metro Community College and, by August 2024, will have completed their associate's degree in applied science for theater tech.

Ally found avenues outside of school to pursue technical theatre, while BT administrators found unique ways to offer programming that would support their passion. Even when enrollment was low, BT offered Technical Theatre so they could explore this interest on campus. That foundation, plus accessing additional programs beyond school, empowered Ally to excel in areas they love.

"BT helped me realize this is a viable career path and has helped me leverage my experience in advocating for new opportunities," Ally explained.

Ally was the first student to run the soundboard for an entire show at BT and has explored other aspects of working behind the scenes such as props through BT's programming.

"BT has exposed me to many different paths my tech career could take and has been supportive in helping me realize my goals."

In addition to supporting Ally in class, BT has worked hard to support their passion *off* campus as well. For example, Dean of Students Meg Harms worked with Ally and their family to ensure their BT classes were in the mornings, so that they could be at Omaha Community Playhouse in the afternoons for their apprenticeship.

When asked what advice they would give other students looking to follow the same path, Ally offered, "Don't let people convince you into the spotlight. It's okay to be backstage. The show can't run without you."

What was your favorite show to work on at BT?

Disney's Descendants (fall 2022) - It was the first musical for which I ran the soundboard.

What was your favorite non-BT production to work on?

A Christmas Carol at Omaha Community Playhouse. I worked with adults who have day jobs and still love theatre and continue to do it in their spare time. I also met people who signed on for some extra money and found along the way that they love doing theatre.

What is your dream show to work on someday?

Any Broadway show ON Broadway.

What is your favorite show you've seen?

Love Never Dies - it was the first show that made me want to pursue theatre tech as a career.

FOCUS AREAS

EAST CAMPUS TRANSFORMATION

Replacing the current Lower School building will be a new state-of-the-art, 50,000 sq. ft. wing for Early Years and Lower School classrooms.

This dynamic, connective addition will also facilitate a new central entrance, as well as floor plans that are more conducive to the range of scholastic and extracurricular activities taking place on campus.

SYSTEMS & INFRASTRUCTURE UPGRADES

Major improvements will include advanced classroom technologies, much-needed mechanical upgrades, enhanced airflow and air exchange systems, and telecommunications infrastructure to support learning. As ever, safety and security will be at the forefront of all campus improvements.

COMMUNITY SPACES

A new main entrance and atrium, reimaged dining hall, and new Lower School and Middle School gym will infuse campus life with vibrant and flexible spaces for gatherings, performances, athletic offerings, competitions, project-based learning opportunities, and more.

"This monumental project is a reflection of our community's inspiring and enduring commitment to our students, informed by a forward-thinking campus master plan, to ensure that BT's goals for a world-class education are appropriately matched with world-class facilities," said Head of School Kristi Gibbs, Ed.D.

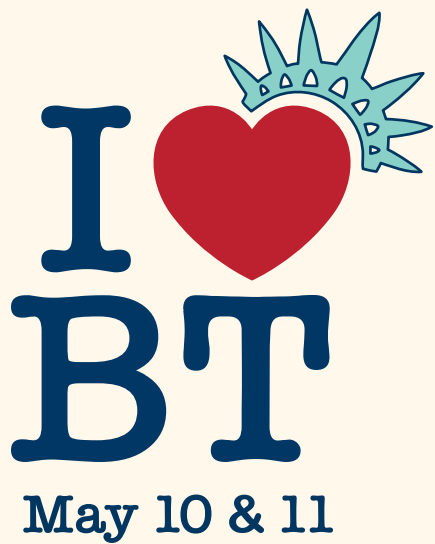

160 Years of Excellence in Education

BT marked 160 years by achieving record enrollment of 490 students and being recognized as Nebraska's premier educational institution by Best of Omaha and Niche.com (see page 3 for more). Here are some highlights from the past 160 years of BT!



1863

Brownell Hall was founded by the Rt. Rev. Joseph Cruickshank Talbot, D.D., then the Episcopal Bishop of the Northwest. It was first a girls boarding school offering cultural and educational opportunities to the daughters of the pioneers, sparing them the long journey to eastern boarding schools. Bishop Talbot named the school for the Presiding Bishop of Connecticut, Thomas Church Brownell, whose parish provided a large portion of the funds needed to purchase the school's first building and grounds.



1868

Brownell Hall held the first commencement exercise in the State of Nebraska when it conferred diplomas upon Nebraska's first high school graduates.

The school relocated to its present site next to Memorial Park in the Happy Hollow and Dundee neighborhood.



1952

The decision was made for Brownell Hall to become coeducational. Boys were enrolled in the Talbot School for Boys, named for the founder of Brownell Hall, Bishop Talbot.



1969

Brownell Talbot became independent of the Episcopal Church.



1963

The school admitted its first freshmen boys and changed its name to Brownell Talbot, taking the names of both bishops responsible for its birth.

Worthington Hall was renovated to include a four-story addition. Swanson Auditorium transformed into a performing arts center to include dressing and makeup rooms, state of the art sound and lighting systems, and seating for more than 300.

2020

COVID-19 caused a global pandemic, forcing schools across the country to move to distance learning, relying heavily on online meetings tools. BT required only two days of “down time” before launching synchronous and asynchronous learning for all students. Students remained in distance learning from mid-March through the end of the school year in May.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

JOEL PASSER, CLASS OF 2005

I currently live in the Boston area and am a neurosurgeon at the Lahey Hospital and Medical Center in Burlington, MA. I sub-specialize in the treatment of brain, skull base, and pituitary gland tumors, as well as traumatic brain injury. I've been married to my wife, Sonia, since 2015 and we have two amazing children, Naomi and Eli.

What led you to become a neurosurgeon?

My dad is a physician as well. He honestly was the biggest inspiration for me to get into medicine. I knew from early on that I wanted to go into medicine, but as a surgeon. I majored in neuroscience in college, but didn't really consider neurosurgery as an option until I was directly exposed to it during medical school. Neurosurgery is an exhilarating, but oftentimes humbling, medical specialty. On a daily basis, I meet with patients and their families when they're at the worst, most stressful times in their lives. It is a tremendous responsibility to be given this privilege, as well as the opportunity to relieve pain, restore function, save a life, or simply provide comfort to those in need.

Your family supports The BT Fund every year.

Why do you give back to BT?

Without a doubt, I would not be who I am today without having been at BT from kindergarten through grade 12. BT provided me so many opportunities for me to be my best self. I give back because I want BT to give the same chance to current/future students to be their best selves and be prepared for whatever they choose as a career.

How did BT help prepare you for what you are doing now?

The academic rigors of BT provided me with the foundation for success in college and medical school (including study habits, time management, organization) that allowed me to pursue a career in neurosurgery.

Which BT teachers had the biggest impact on you?

I am forever indebted to all of my former teachers at BT. The Upper School math and science teachers, especially Beth Anderson, Carrie Rise, Jon Mayo, and Patty Brown. All were instrumental in teaching critical thinking and problem solving skills as well as fostering interest in scientific inquiry. I use all of these on a daily basis. The teachers made learning fun and enjoyable, which is a difficult thing to do - I always looked forward to class with them!

What is something you learned in the last week?

I recently met with a patient who has a pituitary gland tumor, which causes a syndrome called Cushing's Disease. This causes a variety of symptoms due to production of excess cortisol (a stress hormone) in the body. She has kept many horses over the years and taught me that while this disease is fairly uncommon in humans, it's very common in horses!

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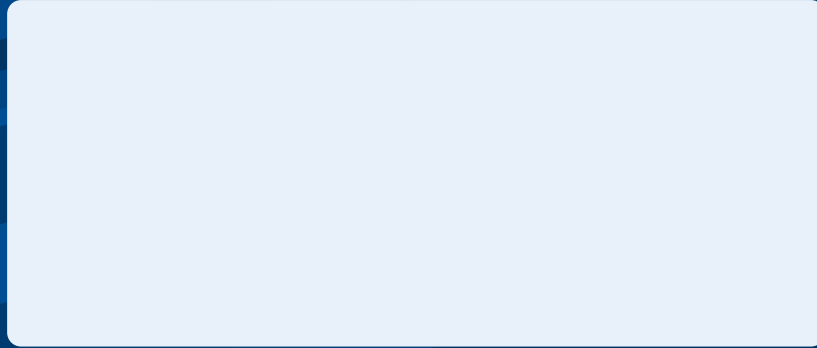
