

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# WHAT'S HAPPENING — ON CAMPUS?











#### 1. Junior Wins Two National Art Awards

Zoe Gilmore, '22, won two National Silver Medals in the Scholastics Art and Writing Awards. More than 80,000 students submitted nearly 230,000 works of art and writing to the 2020 Scholastic Awards. Only 2,000 works received a National Medal, which places Zoe within the top 1% of all submissions.

## 2. Yakking Raiders Continue Legacy of State Wins

The Yakking Raiders, BT's Upper School speech team, earned a first place finish, taking top honors at the Class C-2 State Speech Championship. The Yakking Raiders are perennially one of the state's best teams, having placed 15 times (1st - nine times, 2nd - four times, 3rd - two times) at the state tournament over the past 16 years.

#### 3. Science Bowl Team Wins State

In its second year of competition, BT's Upper School Science Bowl team beat Lincoln East to win the Nebraska State Science Bowl and qualify for the national tournament. #### 4. BT Sweeps Nebraska Stock Market Game

The Stock Market Game is centered around teaching students the fundamentals of personal finance and investing, while practicing content and skills in math, English Language Arts, economics, social studies, and other subjects. The Nebraska game manages over 1,000 teams and helps over 4,500 students learn about U.S. financial markets. The Nebraska game concluded with BT's three teams earning the top three spots in the competition.









#### 5. Senior Named U.S. Presidential Scholar

Aishani Srikumar, '21, was among 161 high school seniors who were selected as 2021 U.S. Presidential Scholars. The White House Commission on Presidential Scholars selects students annually based on their academic success, artistic and technical excellence, essays, school evaluations and transcripts, as well as evidence of community service, leadership, and demonstrated commitment to high ideals.

## 6. Early Years Field Day Offers a Glimpse of Summer Olympics

The theme of this year's Field Day was Olympics: Light the Fire Within. BT's youngest students demonstrated teamwork, good sportsmanship, and competitive spirits as they competed in sack races, bowling, ring toss, and more.

### 7. Varsity Cheer Achieves Safe and Successful Season

In February, the varsity cheer team won the Class C-2 game day competition at the State Cheer and Dance Championships in Grand Island. The team placed first out of nine schools. They were the only team to perform in face

masks, showing their determination and commitment to having a safe and successful cheer season this year.

## 8. Seventh Graders Design American Expansion Board Games

Teachers Betsy Peterson and Amber Straka's seventh grade United States History students culminated their unit on Manifest Destiny by creating board games that included trivia, facts, and pictures of what they had learned about the concept of Manifest Destiny and how America expanded its western border.

## 9. Middle and Upper School Students Give Weight Room a New View

Under the guidance of art teacher Kat Anderson, students spent a good portion of the semester designing, laying out, and painting a new mural in the weight room. #### PLANNING STUDY RESULTS

For the first time in more than a decade, Brownell Talbot shared an overarching vision for its campus and endowment. The school unveiled a new campus master plan and new endowment priorities inspired by the 2019-2023 strategic plan and invited the entire school community to give feedback by participating in a planning study.

Designed to test the BT community's support and to assess the feasibility of a comprehensive capital campaign, the planning study focused primarily on phase one of campus improvements and endowment priorities – including the transformation of East Campus with a new state-of-the-art building to replace the current Lower School wing.

Thank you to the BT family and friends who took time to share their feedback and the Steier Group for conducting the study. The study revealed wide-spread excitement and support to move ahead with the campus master plan. Here are highlights from the study's key findings:

"The community is buzzing about this project! The sooner we start the better."
"This project is long overdue and critical for BT's future."

"The plans are amazing. I love the vision and the potential."

"This plan will help support a growing enrollment."

### OVERALL STUDY OBSERVATIONS

- Participants recognize BT as a premier educational institution with a challenging curriculum that prepares students.
- Participants are excited about the campus master plan and recognize that a significant investment in BT's campus and endowment is overdue and critical to the school's future. Many correlate it with enrollment growth and educational excellence in keeping with the caliber of the BT experience.
- Participants indicated a trust in the community to unite to raise the necessary dollars.

#### **WHAT'S NEXT?**

Participants in the study encouraged the school to maximize the functionality and cost efficiency of the proposed project.

As a result, BT is partnering with Tetrad Property Group, along with Alley Poyner Macchietto Architecture, the architecture firm that created the campus master plan.

Once this assessment is complete, the Board of Trustees will finalize the construction phases and endowment goals, which will then be shared with the entire BT community so that all supporters can begin to think about how they might invest in BT students and campus. We pledge to keep you informed of our progress and plans as we move forward with confidence and excitement for the future.





The value of a Brownell Talbot education is demonstrated in the young adults BT students become during their time here. As the school continues to strengthen and demonstrate its position as a leader in global education, BT created a straightforward way to communicate to prospective and current families the outcomes they can expect when their children graduate from BT. The school's focus is on mastery and personalization of five core competencies so that, as students go beyond its campus, they are prepared to effectively collaborate with and lead people from different national, linguistic, and cultural backgrounds in Omaha and abroad. A BT education provides a distinct and enduring advantage in college and within the competitive global economic environment.

Written in first person, BT graduates should see themselves in these statements:

#### I HAVE A STRONG SENSE OF IDENTITY AND UNDERSTAND THE IMPORTANCE OF MY ROLE IN THE WORLD.

Who I am, my story, is unique. I am shaped by where I come from and the path I have chosen. I have value and so do my ideas. I have a voice and I am motivated to share what I know with others. I am proud of who I am.

I am an individual, but I am not alone. Just as I have value, I recognize that all humans have value and I am curious about others. I know that I don't have all the answers, and I know the convergence of thoughts and experiences generates the best ideas. I believe the diversity of human experience is its strength.

#### I AM AN EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATOR.

In every interaction, I am aware that the process of communication engages the ears and eyes first, seeking to fully understand the words and movements of others. Experiences with those different from me only enhance my ability to communicate and tell my story. Understanding that conflict and disagreement are inevitable, I have the skills to facilitate fair, peaceful, and successful resolutions. I am thoughtful, compassionate, empathetic, and effective in my communication.

#### I AM A CREATOR, IMAGINING NEW FUTURES.

I am proud of what I know and willfully acknowledge there is much I don't know. I am continually learning and perceiving the world in new ways, finding hidden patterns to make connections between seemingly unrelated subjects. I make decisions, solve problems, and take appropriate risks when information is incomplete or not yet known. I am not afraid to fail. It allows me to reflect and find new ways to approach old problems. I believe in my ability to grow and learn.

#### I SEEK MEANING AND PURPOSE IN MY EXISTENCE.


I am motivated to explore my interests, passions, and moral purpose. I seek out opportunities to serve others, the community, and the world. Because I know myself and I am curious about my world, I am prepared to identify an impact only I can make, and I will make it. I strive for balance in my life, knowing it will benefit my personal well-being and the ways in which I am able to contribute to the world.

### I SHARE A DUTY OF STEWARDSHIP FOR THE WORLD I INHABIT.

I am a global citizen. I know my daily actions can and do make an impact and my influence begins with my family, school, and local community. I lead by example in caring for the natural world and for humanity. I am an advocate for myself and for others, speaking up for my own rights and the rights of others.

In 2020, Brownell Talbot partnered with Common Ground Collaborative (CGC), a non-profit organization committed to educating global citizens, in order to establish an agreed-upon foundation for which BT will move forward as a globally minded school. By joining CGC, BT became the only Nebraska school and one of the few North American schools in a network that includes the highest caliber schools around the globe, including International School of Brussels, Zurich International School, Jakarta International School, American Embassy School in New Delhi, United Nations International School, and International School of Bangkok.

At the core of CGC's work is the belief that there are six traits every human has in common and that you must appreciate and nurture each of these in order to be a globally minded citizen:

- Purpose and balance. We all seek meaning and purpose in our existence and we strive towards achieving balance in our lives.
- Imagination and creativity. We are all creators; we are all capable of imagining new futures and making them real.
- Sustainability and systems. We all share a duty of stewardship for the ecosystems we inhabit and to understand how they work.
- Patterns and principles. We all look for recurring patterns and enduring principles to help us make sense of things.
- **Stories and signals.** We are all storytellers; we all send messages to each other.
- Individuals and groups. We all seek personal identity; we all need a place to belong.





The purpose of BT's collaboration with CGC is not to adopt an off-the-shelf identity for how global education manifests at BT. Instead CGC has worked with the school to realize systems that are unique to BT and the school community. The first instance of this was in the creation of BT's portrait of a graduate, which used CGC's six commonalities as a foundation for discussions by the faculty and staff about BT's outcomes, which resulted in the identification of five competencies that are unique to BT graduates (learn more about BT's portrait of a graduate on page 6).

Once the portrait of a graduate was clearly defined, BT worked with CGC through workshops that included faculty, staff, and families to shape the common learning principles of Brownell Talbot and identify the pedagogical practices that support the principles of learning.

"The principles of learning are foundational to building a culture that requires and expects an 'all hands on deck' approach from faculty and staff, as well as families," said Head of School Kristi Gibbs. "The principles and related practices guide every member of our community in how they can support learning that fosters global citizenship."

The focus is now on refining the school's curriculum so it better aligns with the agreed-upon principles and what BT's stakeholders believe is most important when it comes to teaching and learning. This work is being led by CGC member Jay McTighe, who is a veteran educator and author of the Understanding by Design book series.

"The result will be specific observable traits and skills as they relate to each competency of the portrait of a graduate tied to each division level," Gibbs said. To best support students and teachers and communicate with families about progress within this structure, BT recognized the need to re-align responsibilities in a few key areas. The newly created Assistant Head of Academics position, for which the school was still interviewing at the time of publication, requires an administrator with a sound background in teaching and curriculum development. The chosen candidate will lead BT's work with CGC and oversee a new academic support structure so that each division level will have a dedicated administrator:

- The Assistant Head of Academics will serve as the primary contact for Early Years grade 4 families.
- Current Dean of Students Bill Harrell will serve as Dean of Students for grades 5-9, in order to provide continuity and extra support as students transition from Middle School to Upper School and Advisory to House.
- Science Department Chair Meg Harms will continue teaching physics, but in her new position as Dean of Students for grades 10-12, she will serve as a primary contact for grade 10-12 students and families and will work with faculty to support House activities.
- Angela Vetter will continue teaching seventh grade English. In her new role as director of curriculum and instruction, she will guide curriculum development and adoption with a focus on embedding the work with CGC.

"The support and enthusiasm for this work by our faculty and staff has been inspiring. Everyone is excited about the possibilities," Gibbs said, "Our partnership with CGC has really helped us all see how everything - our mission, vision, the portrait of a graduate, principles, practices, and curriculum - fits together and truly positions BT as a leader in global education."







If you are looking for a tangible example of the portrait of a BT graduate competencies in action, look no further than JuSTEMagine. Founder and president Jack Cenovic, '22, had the idea to create a student-driven organization focused on STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) education and social emotional learning (SEL) while he was volunteering with the robotics program at Nelson Mandela Elementary. After a conversation with the school's principal about education inequality and redlining in Omaha, Cenovic wanted to improve access to topics that are not always taught in low income school districts.

"Reading and math are almost always the subjects students are tested on, but they often don't get as much exposure to STEM and SEL," Cenovic said. "Our ultimate goal is to instill within students confidence in their abilities and themselves."

Cenovic sought out students with similar interests to create JuSTEMagine in 2019. The group originally focused on volunteering, often partnering with Completely Kids to offer STEM programming through their after school program. Then the COVID-19 pandemic challenged the group to reimagine their offerings.

With the help of Science Department Chair Meg Harms, JuSTEMagine connected with nonprofits in the Omaha area to continue their work virtually. Prairie STEM, which is focused on improving critical thinking and creativity in preschool - grade 12 students, quickly became an ally and partner in JuSTEMagine's work. The students began writing curriculum to support Prairie STEM's efforts and helped create and distribute more than 17,000 STEM challenge boxes to Omaha-area schools.

Moving their efforts online ended up being a difference maker for the group, helping them to think beyond Omaha's city limits. In addition to having 30 BT students as past or present volunteers, JuSTEMagine is now focused on sharing what they have learned with peers around the world through a chapter program that already includes 17 chapters in the United States, Canada, Iceland, and Turkey.

"Creating a chapter system multiplied our impact exponentially," said treasurer Akshay Mehta, '22. "STEM-oriented students want to do

more but it's not always obvious how to do that. JuSTEMagine gives them a platform."

"We have a lot of flexibility with our chapters," added vice president Riley Hawkins, '22. "We can guide them in setting up similar projects in their region or help them think through executing their own ideas."

Similarly, the BT students behind JuSTEMagine have found a lot of enjoyment in carving out their own specialties within the organization. One example of this is Hawkins' leadership role in girls in STEM initiatives.

"A big part of it for me was creating opportunities for girls," she said. "I wasn't comfortable working in this space until I had Mrs. (Jessica) Ryan as a math teacher. She made me feel like I could excel in science and math, and I want to inspire that same confidence in others."

Through JuSTEMagine, Hawkins has worked with Prairie STEM to organize two Sisters in STEM leadership summits and is currently planning a third with the JuSTEMagine chapter in Greendale, Wisconsin.

As the organization looks to the future, they hope to continue bringing on chapters at a steady pace and have plans to return to partnering with Omaha organizations like Completely Kids to serve as in-person volunteers.

"Our focus will continue to be on empowering others and promoting creative thinking, kindness, inclusivity, and individual emotional wellbeing through STEM so that we can all positively impact the world," said Cenovic.



## Alumni Spotlight

## Jenna Mu, Class of 2018

I am a rising senior at Boston College, studying global public health on the pre-dental track. I'm also a research assistant at the Boston College Global Observatory on Pollution and Health, where I research air and ocean pollution, and ways to address them. I am also a research assistant at the Harvard School of Dental Medicine where I research dental waste around the world and write policy briefs aimed at improving the environmental sustainability of dentistry. This summer, I am an intern at the United Nations Environment Programme where I'm enjoying diving deeper into the world of policy.

## Congratulations on being named a Harry S. Truman Scholar. Can you tell us a little bit more about the program?

The Harry S. Truman scholarship program is a graduate fellowship centered around public service. In addition to receiving funding for graduate school, Scholars attend the Truman Scholars Leadership Week and Summer Institute-the latter of which connects Scholars to internships in Washington, D.C.

#### Did you pick up any pandemic hobbies?

I've been biking outdoors a lot!

### How did BT help prepare you for what you are doing now?

At BT, I developed a variety of skills that I use on a daily basis in college. BT taught me the importance of taking initiative. Through the National Honor Society, I organized the annual food drive at Completely KIDS. When I realized that many kids at the nonprofit didn't have access to musical instruments, I founded Forever Music, an after school program that provides free music lessons to kids. I remember the incredible support that I got from the BT community: Mr. (Bill) Harrell asked parents if they had instruments to donate, Mr. (Jules) DeSalvo gave me advice on how to teach music lessons, and friends from BT signed up to volunteer.

#### Which BT teachers had the biggest impact on you?

The speech coaches, Mr. (Chris) Hamel and Mr. (Mike) Recker, have been really inspirational and influential mentors in my life. They taught me how to communicate effectively, think critically, and use my voice to advocate for what I believe in. They both encouraged me to try extemporaneous speaking (extemp), which is a speech event centered around current events. Extemp has truly been one of the most meaningful experiences of my life and really sparked my interest in policy and advocacy. I'm immensely grateful for the mentorship and support of Mr. Hamel and Mr. Recker.

#### What advice would you give to current BT students?

Throughout my time at BT and in college, I've learned just how important mentorship is. I'd encourage BT students to actively seek out mentors in their classes and extracurricular activities. Having a good support system is crucial and can really help as you explore different colleges and careers.

#### Last book you read?

I recently re-read *Just Mercy*, which is a powerful, life-changing book.

#### What's on your bucket list?

Learn as many Taylor Swift songs as possible on guitar!

#### What is something you learned recently?

This semester, I took a class titled "Children's Health and the Environment." I learned about how the environment is a powerful determinant for children's health and well-being.

#### What's next?

I've become really interested in the intersection between the environment and human health.

Doctor of Medicine in Dentistry
and Master of Public Health
degrees. My overall goal is
to become a dentist and
policymaker who reduces
dental health disparities and
environmental degradation.
