Nebraska Youth Poet Laureate Tanya Bachu,'25

Tanya Bachu, '25, has been named Nebraska's youth poet laureate for 2022-2023. She is the second person ever to serve in this esteemed role.

The Nebraska youth poet laureate program is part of Urban Word NYC's National Youth Poet Laureate initiative that promotes and honors creative students. The initiative produced inaugural poet Amanda Gorman.

Students ages 13-19 can apply to become the Nebraska youth poet laureate.

Bachu had to submit a resume, five poems and a 500-word essay about her community involvement. She was selected from among five finalists.

As Nebraska's youth poet laureate, Tanya will receive year-long guidance from a creative and civic mentor, give readings in Nebraska, and complete a civic engagement community project of her own design, with financial support from the Nebraska Writers Collective.

3. Aidan Halat, '25, Selected to Two-Week Spanish Immersion Program

Aidan Halat, '25, has received the Kevin Cessna-Buscemi Global Citizen Scholarship in recognition for his achievements in the National Spanish Exam, in which he has been gold medalist in the past years.

During the summer, Aidan will join a select group of students from around the country in a residential two-week Spanish immersion program at Concordia Language Villages in Minnesota. The scholarship covers the cost of tuition, all meals, and a stipend for transportation.

4. 10,023 Butterflies

5. Jack Cenovic, '22, Named a U.S. Presidential Scholar

Being named a U.S. Presidential Scholar is one of the highest scholastic honors a student can receive. Of the 3.7 million students expected to graduate from high school this year in the United States, more than 5,000 candidates qualified for the 2022 awards determined by outstanding performance on the College Board SAT or ACT exams or through nominations.

6. Middle School 4x800 Team Places at State

Olivia Grogan, '26, Corbett Lanum, '26, Abbi Gibbs, '26, and Nya Ping, '26, placed third at the Middle School State Track Meet in Gothenburg, Nebraska, and broke their own school record for the second time this season with a time of 10:33.

7. Robotics Teams Win at Worlds

Upper School's 1028Z, which includes Akshay Mehta, '22, Josh Randolph, '22, Jack Cenovic, '22, and Francesca Vidal, '24, won the Design Award and the Community Award for online-based education and outreach at the 2022 Vex World Robotics Competition.

Middle School's 1028Y, which includes Rital Miller, '26, Akhil Mehta, '26, Angel Bhandari, '26, Ahaan Gulati, '26,

Ann Mammen, '26, and Cillian Rochling, '26, also won the Design Award. The Design Award is the second highest award presented to teams!

9. BT Wins Both Divisions at A Cappella Championships

BT's pop a cappella ensembles Pirate Radio and On Deck competed in the third annual Nebraska A Cappella Championships at Columbus High School. On Deck swept the Middle School Division, with Addy Haynes, '26, earning top soloist; Avery Nichols, '26, and Theo Hedican, '26, earning both Honorable Mention soloist awards; and the full group winning the Middle School Division championship.

Pirate Radio won the High School Division championship in spectacular fashion, and both its soloists Alice Chan, '22, and Maia Su, '22, earned Honorable Mention awards.

BT's New Assistant Head of Academics

Verbatim: Transforming Student Reporting

Many great things happened during the 2021-2022 school year, and *Verbatim*, BT's student-run newspaper, was there to report them. In December, sophomore Frida Silva spotlighted the experiences of BT's first generation American students. Through the Community Voices column, students and teachers have weighed in on everything from school lunch to school spirit. In February, several students collaborated on an editorial about A2C, "the subreddit shaping college admissions." Each edition of *Verbatim* has also offered reviews on movies, albums, restaurants, and more.

What wasn't reported on: *Verbatim's* own transformation. Before the 2020-2021 school year, *Verbatim* was laid out in Google Docs and then printed copies were left in the concessions area for passersby to pick up on a whim. For most of last year, *Verbatim* was published online using a more rudimentary site through Google sites. Leading into the 2021-2022 school year, the school made two key investments that drove major changes: a membership subscription for a SNOsites.com website and the equipment needed to record podcasts.

"It has been exciting to be able to put in front of students the tools necessary to make the kind of content they want to produce," said journalism teacher Matt Low.

Although *Verbatim's* primary audience is Upper School students, the editors work hard to ensure there's something for everyone in each issue. And only once has a story been pulled for not being appropriate for the Middle School segment of its audiences: the missing Episode 1 of their pop culture podcast, Raider Rebel, centered on the TV-MA show *Euphoria*.

"We're focused on covering issues relevant to what's happening in people's daily lives and being responsive to the type of content they want to read," said 2022-2023 Editor-in-Chief Claire Cenovic, '23.



What's next for Verbatim?

"We would eventually like to have an app so that we can provide a more mobile friendly version to our audiences," said Low. "We're also hoping there is an appetite for a podcast club as an extension of *Verbatim* so there is time to develop and produce those stories."





At the close of the Constitutional Convention in 1787, when asked if the framers had created a monarch or a republic, Benjamin Franklin replied that America would be "a republic, if you can keep it." Franklin makes the point that "you," the American people, must be active civic participants for the system to function properly, reflect the values and will of the people, and ultimately survive.

Skills that are deemed critical to civic engagement speaking, listening, collaborating, information gathering and processing, and advocacy - are baked into Brownell Talbot's Portrait of a Graduate. And while all BT teachers work to strengthen these skills, it is really the History Department who takes on the weighty responsibility of teaching the skills in the context of civic education.

Researchers have warned that civic engagement has been declining nationally for several decades. Reasons that contribute to this decline include political dysfunction, polarized media, and technology. BT teachers note that, compared to students they've taught at other schools, BT students have always been more aware of what's going on in the world and interested in discussing it. However, how they participate in those conversations has changed.

"Students seem more excited than ever to engage in discussion, but at the same time they are less comfortable with having their biases challenged," said Upper School history teacher Dan Coffey. "More students want to advocate and defend their position, but they seem not as willing to listen to the other side. We constantly tell students that as their viewpoints are challenged, conversations will get uncomfortable. But discomfort is a good thing."

"This is the reality of a democratic society. You will run into people you disagree with," said History Department Chair Mark Smith. "At BT we are focused on helping our students develop the skills they need to be curious, open minded, and questioning so that when they are challenged, their response is to listen, not shut down."

It starts with learning civic values like an appreciation of civil discourse and free speech by having respectful conversations with peers and teachers. BT's coursework provides the necessary civic knowledge - things like the processes of government, political ideologies, civic and constitutional rights - for students to understand how to participate and how to have an impact. Armed with these skills and knowledge, BT students are then encouraged and empowered to take on civic behaviors like voting, volunteering in the community, and attending public meetings.

BT's history teachers motivate students to be interested in civic education by connecting classwork to current events and allowing students to steer where the lessons will go. Middle School teacher Betsy Peterson's U.S. History class was keenly interested in the Supreme Court this year because the lesson coincided with the confirmation of Ketanji Brown Jackson. Following the confirmation hearings in the news sparked the students' desire to know more about the court's history and diversity, so Peterson adjusted her plans. "We are really fortunate that BT encourages teachers to let the teaching follow the students' interests," said Peterson. "When I worked in public schools, every fifth grade classroom followed the same weekly calendar. Our flexible structure allows students to drive the learning, which is critical to keeping them engaged."

In history teacher Amber Straka's elective, "It's a Riot: the History of Civil Disobedience," students contributed to the curriculum by choosing the topics the class covered. They also were asked to extend their learning into advocacy by identifying their state senators and writing to them about a topic that they are passionate about.

In Smith's Politics Club, he facilitates the discussion, but it is really the student leaders who pick which topics are covered, and every student is empowered to submit source material for participants to read ahead of each club meeting. The club is a safe space for students to gain exposure to the debate process and learn best practices for vetting information and considering counter arguments.

"BT is awesome in that respect because, unlike most other schools, Upper School students are required to take four years of history and there are several related electives and clubs," said Smith. "We know that we are probably not graduating a class full of future history teachers. Our commitment to civic education shows that, as a school, we see the value in having an engineer who understands how the political process works, a doctor who actively supports community interests, a designer who has the agency to participate in local elections."

Tips from BT's History Department

Never attack the person on the other side of any argument. Respect their humanity and their right to form their own opinion. Go into conversations with the intent to share information, not to change minds.

Be involved - sign the petitions that matter to you, attend public meetings, and vote, especially in local elections which will have a more immediate, noticeable impact on your life.

Examine your sources for accuracy, separating fact from opinion. Expand your information
 sources by seeking
 out countering
 points of view.

In all facets of your life, focus on having conversations in person, not online.


