WHAT'S HAPPENING — ON CAMPUS?—











- 1. BT's cheerleading team were State Runners-up in C2 Gameday and C2 Traditional at the State championships.
- 2. BT's 8 & under club swim team achieved a remarkable three-peat victory at the Midwestern Swimming 8 & Under Championships, dominating the combined team scores.
- Corbett Lanum, '26, competed in the 3200m run and the 1600m run at State track & field. Corbett was the district Champion in the 3200m and placed third in the 1600m at Districts.
- 4. BT's theatre troupe garnered Gold, the highest level of distinction awarded, at the 2024 Nebraska Thespian Festival.
- 5. BT's varsity girls basketball team beat College View Academy to earn their sixth Frontier Conference championshp tournament in seven years.

- 6. In February BT's Acadec team won the State championship in the very small school division, finished 2nd amongst the Small School division, and 3rd in the whole state. This victory marked back-to-back State championships for the team.
- 7. BT's Math Team participated in the annual University of Nebraska-Lincoln Math Day. The first team clinched first place in class B, while BT's second team secured a second place finish in class C.
- 8. BT had three students whose talents warranted letter of intent signings this spring:
 - Mia Hatcher, '24, will attend the United States Naval Academy.
 - Lia Li, '24, will play soccer at Rome City Institute in Italy.
 - Hudson McCafferty, '24, will run cross country at Midland University.


















- 9. Team 1028 topped off another outstanding VEX robotics season by sending two robot teams from Upper School (1028A and 1028Z) and three teams from Middle School (1028J, 1028T and 1028Y) to the VEX World Championship in Dallas, TX. Nearly 1,300 teams from over 50 countries participated in the VEX World Championship. Team 1028A earned the Amaze Award, which recognizes a consistently high-performing and competitive robot.
- 10. This year, BT extended the Dianne K. Desler Leadership Award program to honor two teachers: history and religion teacher Mark Smith and history and ELL teacher Amber Straka. The award is the highest honor a BT faculty member can receive. It is awarded annually to an individual who is committed to excellence, demonstrates leadership, and models lifelong learning.
- 11. Students had a stellar view of April's historic solar eclipse, safely watching through protective glasses as the moon gradually covered the sun.
- 12. At this year's NSAA District Music Contest, BT's musicians outperformed all other schools, with Upper School orchestra, Gold Tones Jazz Combo, Raider Blues Jazz Combo, and choir earning unanimous Superior ratings and five individual Superior ratings.
- 13. BT's Middle School Science Olympiad team represented the state of Nebraska at the 40th Science Olympiad National Competition hosted by Michigan State University. To earn the appointment, the team finished 1st place in their division at the state competition.

In Mrs. Carrie Rise's Multivariable Calculus class, students were challenged to connect their advanced mathematical knowledge to real-world applications. With a desire to inspire younger students and nurture their love for math, the class embarked on an ambitious project - creating an educational video game.

The journey began with a collaborative effort to identify a need and develop a solution. After careful consideration, the students decided to focus on helping younger BT students become more interested and confident in their math journeys, paving the way for them to reach the level of Multivariable Calculus when they reach Upper School.

To ensure the game's relevance and appeal, the Multivariable Calculus students partnered with BT's fourth grade classes for product research and testing. Through interactive sessions, they gathered insights into the students' relationships with math and explored whether a video game could enhance their learning experience. This feedback helped them define their target market and tailor the game's design accordingly.

With a general understanding of where they wanted to go with the project, the class formed specialized teams to tackle various aspects of game development. These teams included coding, animation/character development, educational development and outreach, interface design, planning, quality assurance, project management, game testing, and general development.

"The hardest part of the game development was just getting started because there were so many unknowns," said Francesca Vidal, '24, who was part of the educational development and outreach team. "Once we formed our teams and were able to focus just on our roles, it got a lot easier."

Drawing inspiration from the popular Donkey Kong franchise, the students created "BT Barrel Bash," a game where players must solve math problems by bashing the correct number/barrel answers and

avoiding the wrong ones. The game features familiar characters like Mario, Princess Peach, Toad, Yoshi, and Bowser, making it both engaging and relatable for younger players.

Mrs. Rise commended her students' problem-solving skills and open-mindedness throughout the development process.

"Part of the reason they are in Multivariable Calculus is because they have outstanding problem-solving skills. Creating the game has posed a lot of problems, and everyone has approached it with such an open mind and an attitude of, 'I don't know how to solve it, but I am willing to try."

The project required students to venture into unfamiliar territories and acquire new skills. The interface development team studied online resources and created each screen using the free online graphic design tool Canva. The animation/character design team learned Photoshop and scripting techniques to bring their characters to life. Even coding posed challenges, as the students had to adapt their game to work in a Mac environment after initially coding it for the internet.

After countless hours of hard work and learning, the students were able to conduct a soft rollout with the fourth grade classes, testing the game and identifying areas for improvement. This feedback will be invaluable as next year's Multivariable Calculus class takes over the project, continuing to refine and enhance the educational gaming experience.

Most importantly, they showcased their commitment to inspiring the next generation of math enthusiasts, ensuring a lasting impact on the BT community.

Civil Rights Movement Inquiry Brings History to Life

This year, Brownell Talbot introduced an engaging new course offering for Upper School students. The class was added to provide students with an in-depth exploration of modern American history, spanning from World War II to the present day. As part of the course, students delved into the Civil Rights Movement, a pivotal era that shaped the nation's journey toward equality and justice. Beyond the well-known figures like Rosa Parks, Cesar Chavez, Martin Luther King Jr., and Robert F. Kennedy, the class challenged students to research lesser-known but equally significant individuals who played crucial roles in the movement.


As part of the course, students conducted an extensive study of the Freedom Rides, a series of groundbreaking acts of civil disobedience that challenged segregation in interstate transportation. Students examined the Freedom Rides from various angles, including the routes taken, the participants involved, media coverage, political influences, lasting effects, and personal accounts.

One of the most remarkable experiences of the unit was a virtual meeting with Carol Ruth Silver, a lawyer, civil rights activist, and Freedom Rider herself. Silver, who was arrested and incarcerated for 40 days in Mississippi for her participation in the movement, shared her firsthand experiences and insights with the students, providing a powerful connection to the history they had studied.

As part of their inquiry-based learning, the students also explored the Omaha bus system, analyzing its routes and identifying areas of the city that are underserved. This local connection reinforced the ongoing relevance of transportation equity and accessibility.

The class also had the opportunity to attend a screening of the film "John Lewis: Good Trouble" at Film Streams, followed by a thought-provoking discussion with students from other schools. This interdisciplinary approach fostered a deeper understanding of the Civil Rights Movement and its enduring impact on society.

Through this innovative U.S. History course, BT students not only gained a comprehensive understanding of pivotal events but also developed a profound appreciation for the sacrifices and struggles that paved the way for progress. By connecting the past to the present, they were empowered to become agents of positive change.

Departmental Enhancements Supported by New Hires

The **Science Department** is making intentional moves to enhance BT's STEM offerings and educational outreach initiatives. By introducing a new STEM coordinator position the school will have additional resources to drive forward-thinking programming, including service learning, AI exploration, internships, and global education. This role will also involve teaching key STEM and elective courses. Additionally, the department is adjusting faculty assignments to better align with educational goals, including shifts in Middle and Lower School science instruction. These changes aim to provide a more comprehensive and progressive science curriculum across all grade levels.

The **Math Department** is implementing a cross-divisional teaching approach beginning with the 2024-2025 school year. Under this new structure, all faculty members will teach a combination of Middle and Upper School classes. This strategic shift is designed to create a more intentional and seamless progression as students advance through grade levels, ensuring consistent methodology and a deeper understanding of individual student needs.

The **Counseling Department** is expanding its college counseling services to provide even more comprehensive support for students in their college admissions journey. BT is enhancing the department with additional expertise in both college counseling

and admissions processes. This will allow BT to offer more personalized guidance, drawing on a wealth of experience from various perspectives within higher education. The goal is to equip students with the knowledge and support they need to navigate the increasingly complex college application landscape successfully.

These departmental changes reflect Brownell Talbot's commitment to continuous improvement and innovation in academic programs, ensuring the school provides the best possible educational experience for our students.



HONORING

Bill Beavers and Bruce Lauritzen

In 2024, Brownell Talbot lost two major supporters and friends of our school and community.



Bill Bruce Beavers, 1936-2024

Bill Beavers was deeply devoted to his family, faith, and the Omaha community. He spent over five decades in the financial services industry, retiring in 2015 as Senior Vice President of Ameritas Investment Corp. Equally important was his 50-year membership at

Dundee Presbyterian Church, where he served as the announcer for the Church of the Air on KFAB for 36 years and held numerous leadership roles.

The Beavers family has a long history with Brownell Talbot. Bill and his wife Mary Ann raised three children who attended Brownell Talbot, Brett, '82, Bethany, '86, and Belinda, '87. Bill served as a trustee on Brownell Talbot's Board for 10 years (1981-1991), five of which were spent as Board president. As president, he worked diligently to keep major gifts in the forefront of BT's long-term planning, speaking on the school's behalf to countless business and corporate colleagues. He aided the school's fiscal stability by spearheading the Private Placement Bond Issue. Bill and Mary Ann were instrumental in supporting BT during many annual, capital, and endowment campaigns, including funding improvements to St. Matthias Chapel and developing the fitness center and wellness programming at the school.

The Beavers family kindly directed memorials for Bill to the Brett Beavers Memorial Scholarship Fund at BT,

which was established in 1982, at the time of Brett's death. The scholarship fund has been continuously supported by family, friends, alumni, faculty, staff, trustees, and members of the Omaha community to honor and perpetuate the memory of Brett. This fund provides opportunities for other young people to learn and grow at Brownell Talbot and endures to this day.

Bill's grandchildren, Audrey Graves, '18, Brett Graves, '17, and Amelia Bell, '25, continue Beavers' legacy at Brownell Talbot.

Bruce R. Lauritzen, 1943-2024

Bruce Lauritzen, a revered member of the Brownell Talbot community, passed away in February. Lauritzen was well-known in Omaha as an incredible businessman and inspiring leader, with a career at FNBO spanning over 55 years.

The Lauritzen family's rich history with Brownell Talbot dates back to the school's founding in 1863. Bishop Clarkson, instrumental in relocating the school to facilitate growth, became president of the Board of Trustees in 1868. Until his death in 1884, Bishop Clarkson maintained a deep commitment to Brownell Hall.

For generations, the Lauritzen family has contributed greatly to the school through their legacy of support and service. Bruce carried on this spirit of community and philanthropy, serving as a dedicated trustee from 1979 to 1988. His three children - Meg Lauritzen, '86, Clark Lauritzen, '95, and Blair Lauritzen Gogel, '88 - continued the family tradition by attending Brownell Talbot.

Bruce Lauritzen's impact on the school and the broader Omaha community will be long remembered. The Lauritzen family's multi-generational ties to Brownell Talbot exemplify the deep-rooted connections that have shaped the school into the esteemed institution it is today.

Jorge Sotolongo, Class of 2006

I've been married to my wife, Joanna, for seven years and we have three children. Our oldest, Valentina, just completed her first year of Early Years at Brownell Talbot. I have been doing commercial real estate since we moved back to Omaha in late 2017. I currently serve on the Omaha Planning Board and the Board of Directors for the Greater Omaha YMCA.
